MURDER IN NEWCASTLE.—On the evening of Thursday the 15th inst., John Smith, labourer, died in the Newcastle Infirmary from the effects of a blow which had been given him by a fellow workman named Thomas Fothergill. The particulars of the case are as follows:—The deceased, whose

parents reside in Norfolk, was about 24 years of age, and on Saturday afternoon the 3rd inst., was

age, and on Saturday afternoon the 3rd inst., was working as a labourer in a stone quarry belonging to Mr. Cant, in Elswick-lane, in the western part of Newcastle. The accused (Fothergill), who is about fifty years of age, and a powerful man, was working with him, and an Iriahman named Michael Dunn was labouring in the quarry at the same time. Fothergill was working with a pick-axe, and the deceased was employed in wheeling away soil and material which Fothergill excavated. In the course of the work the deceased had, whether in jest or in earnest seems a matter of doubt, charged the prisoner, Fothergill, with being slow, or getting on very badly with his work. Statements of this kind had been exchanged between them; and it appears that Fothergill became exasperated, and when the deceased was wheeling away his barrow, he followed him with his pick-axe and struck him a violent blow on the head with it, from the effects

Yet when he was thus disabled, the prisoner struck him on the side, and fearing that Fothergill was going to strike the unfortunate man again, the other labourer (Dunn) ran up, took 'the pick-axe from Fothergill's hand, and separated the two men. Smith, from whose head blood was proceeding, lay a short time insensible; but afterwards rallied sufficiently to walk to his lodgings, though still unable to speak; and at his lodgings he wrote on a slate that he had been struck by a man with a pick-axe. His landlady subsequently had him taken to the Infirmary. He was found to be suffering from a severe fracture at the top of the skull, and an operation had to be performed, in which a small bone was taken from the wounded part. Little hopes were entertained of his recovery, and he lingered in pain till Thursday evening, at nine o'clock, when he expired.
