Teesdale Mercury.

BARNARD CASTLE, NOVEMBER 22nd, 1882.

Ar a meeting of the Teesdale Board of Guardians, on Wednesday last, the Clerk stated that, though they had advertised for a Porter for the Workhouse, they had had but one applicant. We may remark that the advertisement (which appeared in our columns) would be read by many hundreds of people in Teesdale and the adjacent districts, as well as by not a few at a greater distance, and it must have been the smallness of the proffered salary. £15 a-year, that deterred persons from applying for the situation. The guardians have now resolved to offer £20 s-year, so that, without much further advertising, they will doubtless have an abundance of applicants.

Mr W. M. EGGLESTONE, of Stanhope (well-known in the field of local literature), has favoured us with the first part of his work on "Stanhope and the Neighbourhood." We have read the book with great attention, and have thereby gained much valuable nformation. We can very cordially recommend Mr Egglestone's new venture, and can bear testimony to the carefulness and accuracy that have been exercised in its preparation. As may be anticipated, much space is devoted to lead-mining (the staple industry of Weardale), and Mr Egglestone traces its bistory back to the earliest period. Stanhope Church and Castle, Bishop Butler, and other notable places and person receive due mention ; the statements as to ancient forest custems, old hunting expeditions, &c., will be specially attractive to the antiquarian reader; whilst modern details are given in an able and pleasing manner. We may add that the book may be had, post-free, from the Author, for thirteen penny stamps.

Many of our readers will have noticed the huge Boulder that lies in the bed of the Deepdale Beck, half-way between the mill and the railway-viaduct and some of them will remember that, at one time there was a board, bearing some lines referring to the boulder, affixed to an adjacent tree. The board has long been gone, but, through the kindness of a friend, we are enabled to present a copy of the lines that were inscribed upon it, as follows :-

Pray, whence cam'st thou, a stranger in the land? What stopp'd thy progress in this pleasant Dale? Wert thou from Shap? and brought by fairy hand, As felspar crystals mark thee from that Fell ? How cam'st thou here? What bore thee on thy way? To raise our thoughts, and praise the God of Heaven !

Faw people have any idea of the extensive emigration that has taken place from the Teesdale district, into the United States and Canada, during the last twentyfive years, but evidence of this reaches us, occasionally, in a somewhat interesting manner. For instance, in the spring of last year we published a letter from Mr Lithgow James (Mr James Smith) a member of Miss Emma Abbott's well-known Opera Company, then making a tour in the United States; and in a note to the letter we stated that our correspondent was a son of Mr William Smith, implement manufacturer, Barnard Castle. Mr James Smith, in a subsequent communication, tells us that, on the arrival of the Company at Philadelphia, some few months after he had first written to us, a lady waited upon him, and he found that his visitor was a native of Barnard Castle. On asking her how she had obtained the information that Lithgow James, of Miss Abbott's Company, was James Smith, of Barnard Castle, she replied that she and her husband had the Teesdale Mercury forwarded to them every week; she had read his letter in that paper, and on learning that Miss Abbott's Company were coming to Philadelphia, she had determined to call upon him. Mr Smith was introduced to the lady's husband, and was much gratified with the interview. On Miss Abbott's Company arriving at Erie, a gentleman called to see Mr Smith. He also said that he was from Barnard Castle, and regularly received the Teesdale Mercury, and had thus learned the identity of Mr Litbgow James. This gentleman's name was John Elliott (a son of the late Mr Archibald Elliott. of Barnard Castle), and he had proceeded to America about 25 years before. His business was that of railway-carriage building, he employed nearly 200 hands, and was in very good circumstances. At Chicago, and other places in Canada and the United States, Mr Smith met with similar receptions. In the mining regions of the United States there are many Teesdale men, all of whom like to hear news from home, and to many of whom this newspaper is regularly forwarded. Only the other day we had letters from three of our readers-one in Nevada (California), one in New York. and one in London (Canada)-asking us questions with regard to Mr Richard Watson's poems.

Death of the Oldest Tenant on the Raby Estates.—The remains of Mr Hilton Heslop, of Marwood, who died on the 15th inst., were interred in the Cemetery, at Barnard Castle, on Monday last Deceased was 82 years of age, and he was the representative of a family whose name is indissolubly associated with the occupation of land in Marwood. Mr Hilton Heslop succeeded his father on the farm, which he has held under four successive Dukes of Cleveland, and, at the time of his death, it is believed. that he was the oldest tenant on the Raby estates, whilet his progenitors had farmed the land from the reign of Queen Elizabeth, A.D. 1570. Mr Heslop was a devoted churchman, and for a long term of years was Churchwarden for Marwood, and, be the weather "fair or foul," the deceased was succeeding Sunday, and attended, moreover, most assiduously, to the duties of his office. "Hilton Healop" came weekly to the Barnard Castle market for many years, the last occasion of his being in the town being at the General Election in 1880, since which time his health has gradually failed. Mr Heslop leaves a family to succeed him, and, practically enjoying the advantages of a perpetual lease, the Heelops of Marwood will doubtless yet long be known in the township. The whole of the work has been carried out by Mr Hedley, of Queen Street, Barnard Castle, in a borough workmanlike manner, and to the entire satisfaction of the vicar, churchwarders, and committee. The following committee, ably assisted by the practical advice of Mr. William Nevison, have been surcensiting in their efforts to bring the work to successful issue:—Messrs. Watson, Healop, Marshall, Nevison; and the churchwardens, Messrs. Harrison and Thompson. These gentlemen have saved the parish at least the som of £20 by securing the tandards at so moderate a price.
