Castle, and Pluvius reigned supreme all day, and interfered very much with the attendance. In fact it is feared that the committee will have to draw considerably upon their reserve fund. The fruit in particular was of a high class, grapes, melons, and peaches being exceptionally fine. Mesers Finlay, Westcott, and Bowlzer were the chief prize-takers. The blooms of hollyhocks exhibited by Mr Finlay were perfection, and the array of fuchsias and geraniums in open class were commended on every hand. There was the usual rivalry among cottagers, and Mr C. Hedley exhibited a rose which for richness had no equal. Attention was directed to the stand of herbaceous plants, and the judges had disqualified the collection exhibited by Mr John Roe, of the Bowes Museum Gardens, because he had included a Lily Auratum. When the judges met, afterwards, Mr Sibbald drew attention to the matter, in response to the "Health of the Judges," most heartily proposed by Mr Waistell, at dinner. He urged that it would be more satisfactory if the schedule distinctly stated whether this specimen was included or excluded. 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
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
