FIRST BREATH OF WINTER.

During Saturday night a heavy rain descended in the watershed of the Tees, and on Sunday morning, the river was in high flood. Anglers were hopeful that salmon in plenty might now ascend the stream. The weather, however, was not so propitious, and more especially the evening, was bitterly cold, and on Monday morning, the higher hills of Teesdale were thickly covered with snow. Royal Motor Ride over the Pennines.

REGAL RECEPTIONS AT BOWES, BARNARD CASTLE, AND STAINDROP.

HISTORICAL MEETING OF HIS MAJESTY AND LORD BARNARD.

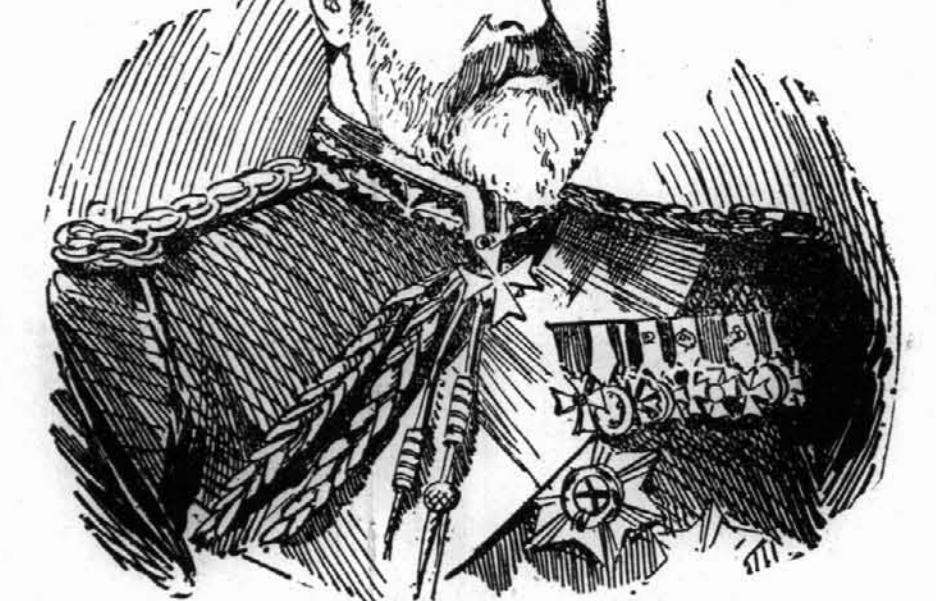
The visits of kings, like those of angels, are few and far between, and, accordingly, Friday, the thirteenth of October, in the year of grace one thousand nine hundred and five, will long be memorable in the annals of Teesdale as the day upon which His Majesty King Edward VII. first saw romantic Bowes, Bowes, Barnard Castle, Staindrop and the fine feudal residence of Raby Castle.

The much-talked-of excursion over the Pennines, from Brougham Hall to Raby Castle, had aroused considerable local interest, nearly forty years having elapsed since His Majesty, then Prince of Wales, visited Teesdale.

At a late hour on Thursday night orders were issued altering the arrangements. The start was provisionally fixed for 10-30, but the time was changed to 11-30, with the probability of setting out a quarter-of-an-hour before the latter time, according to circumstances. The first intimation that the King was about to start was obtained when Mr. C. de Coursey Parry, Chief Constable of Cumberland and Westmoreland, left the hall at 10-50, his companion, on Mr. Allan Hodgson's motor, being Captain Spencer Ferguson, Cockermouth. The arrangement was that Mr. Parry should leave half-an-hour in advance of the Royal party, and this was practically carried out. Lord Brougham and Major-General Sir Stanley de Astel Calvert Clark, Esquerry in attendance, entered the King's small car. His Majesty, who was accompanied by the Hon. Mrs. Derek Keppel, occupied his forty-horse-power motor, and in two others which followed were Lady Brougham, the Hon. Eleanor Brougham, and others. An emergency car brought up the rear.

Punctually at 11-25 Lord Brougham's car left the hall, followed at a distance of about fifty yards by the King's vehicle, while the others came at somewhat longer distances.

The scene at Barnard Castle. "Aye, every inch a King," said Lear to Gloucester, and this is the estimate of the Teesdale people of King Edward VII., who is certainly the hardest working, as he is the most popular, monarch who ever reigned over the destinies of a great, free, and enlightened people. The moment it was known that the King of England

The King was warmly wrapped up, and seemed better than he was the previous evening. His Majesty instantly returned the salutations of the thousands who lined the route. The cars passed out of the main road, and soon a splendid speed was attained. In the early morning the road was very sticky, owing to the rain, but the stony surface was completely dried in less than two hours, so that by eleven o'clock the surface was perfect, there being, of course, no dust.

Then began the long ascent of Stainmore, the road rising to an altitude of 1,900 feet in six miles. The powerful cars made little of this, and maintained a good pace through the Coronation festivities that the King would at no distant future date pass leisurely through their old-time village. Thanks to His Majesty's desire to see the princely pile of Raby, we had a favourable opportunity of seeing our King pass by our own doors without that rush and push and craning of necks which often occurs at a large town. Although our Parish Council took no steps to decorate the village, yet private enterprise was not wanting to make the long, straggling street look neat, gay, and picturesque, with its flags and bunting flying in the breeze. Most of the houses put out some sort of demonstration of loyal feeling. The villa, at the west end entrance to the village, was quite handsome with its flags and streamers. Near to the school a line of streamers stretched across the road from Annam's Villa to Mr. Alderson's, and the gateway leading down to Gilmonby Hall, at the east end of the village, and where the road makes a sharp, short turn at right angles, Mrs. Dugdale and party had some very nice decorations of flags, plants, etc. Many people were astir early, and the village assumed a festive air. The morning was bright, and at times sunny. A bitter north wind was blowing across the west end of Bowes as the cars, conveying the King's party, bore in sight about 12-40 p.m. Here, at the entrance to the village, the owner of the Villa was practically alone in welcoming the King. From this spot, the school from the street was empty, few villagers only standing at their gates or doors. At the Grammar School the children were drawn up in lines in their yard, and sang very effectively the National Anthem, and then, at the Royal car passed in front of them, gave three hearty cheers, which the King smilingly acknowledged. The children had the

The Bank was very artistically adorned. At the foot was the appropriate device, "Long may the King reign over us," stretched across the street, in white letters on a red ground, and there was a capital array of bannetries, hunting banners, and emblematic national flags. There was quite a little crowd at Bilgiate-end, and both sides of the acclivity were lined with sightseers, the ordinary population of Barnard Castle having been materially augmented by visitors from northern towns and notably from Darlington, Bishop Auckland, the valley of the Tees, and the whole of the surrounding neighbouring villages. Everybody was anxious to see the King, and to make any sacrifice to encompass that end.

The scene was a most memorable and picturesque. At the low side of the Market Cross some six hundred children from the elementary schools were drawn up, their faces beaming with joyous expectation, and radiant with smiles. The Rev. W. Penrose, M.A., Vicar, Mr. Banks, Head Master of the National Schools; Mr. W. Emerson, Head Master of the Wesleyan Day School; a substitute acting Head Master, A. M. Scand, of the Roman Catholic School; and Mrs. Stephenson, Head Mistress of the Victoria British Infant School, marshalled the children with the greatest care, and bright and joyous were the faces of them.
