BOY FATALLY TRAPPED AT A FALL OF TIMBER.

Scene Near the Barnard Castle Casworks.

On Monday afternoon, At the police court, arnard Castle, Mr Coroner J. T. Joseph Winter Nixon, gamekeeper, Marwood ottage-close to the spene of the accidentsaid he saw the deceased at the place indicated thabout half-past six or a quarter-to-seven felled, and the lad was in the middle of them, alone. Witness thought he was perfectly safe. He was gathering sticks into a little bag, and witness never spoke to him.

John Simpson, blacksmith, 5, Baliol-street, said he found the deceased at naif-past eight 'clock on Friday morning, as he was returning to the gasworks, after breakfast. The lad looked as though he had been dead some time. He ran for assistance, and the police were informed. The body was cold. The opinion he formed was that the tree had shifted, and the lad was pinned between two trees, his body lying backwards.

James Henry Willan, Staindrop, assistant forester to Lord Barnard, who helped to extricate the body, said he left the tree perfectly safe at four o'clock on Thursday afternoon. The deceased was lying across the branches of the other trees, and a tree, which had moved a few yards, possibly on the branches, was across him. The boy had apparently been caught by his stocking in the branches. There was no indication of a struggle, and he appeared to have been crushed and killed at once. The tree which hold him was the smallest tree which they had felled. With a little assistance the lad could have been got out the night before. thought he had probably suffocated. Witness
