Descon. of Barnard Castle. The edifice is built of local stone, with s slate roof, the priocipals of which latter rest on four corbels. The ceiling is of varnished wood, with an open roof. The large noom is thirty feet by sweavy feet, and there is a diminutive chancel ton feet by six feet, a felding screen dividing the chaucel from the hall itself. The attar table, credence table, and two chairs, all presented by Lord Barnard, are of oak, together with aixty or seventy hassocks. The heaving apparatus has been supplied by Messrs R.
