Since the re-opening of the school, after th midsummer holiday, the following contribu-tions have been forwarded to the central depôt:-Weeks ending 27th August, 3rd September, and 10th September, 58, 83, and 66 eggs respectively. The considerable decrease in numbers is due to the scarcity of eggs. During the twelve weeks in which the collection has been made we have forwarded 1,439 eggs, and the sum of £1 4s. 1d. Owing to the difficulty in obtaining a supply of eggs each week, and now that the cold weather is approaching, we have decided to discontinue the collection of eggs for some weeks at any rate, and collect money to provide material for the making of comforts for our soldiers. If any of our helpers are desirous of continuing their contributions of eggs or money, the same will be forwarded to headquarters. The number of eggs urgently needed is at present very great, and now that a forward move is made in the western theatre of the war this number will be considerably increased.
