

Son of the Mipon of Lhasa in Teesdale. A GREAT TIBETAN NUBLEMAN.

INTERESTING SKETCH.

The son of a great Tibetan nob e, the Mipon of Lbass, is at present paying a visit 'n a gentleman living near Barnard Cartle. 1.bet is, since its expulsion of the Chicese, an independent power. Its ruler, the Delai Lama. while a fugitive from the Obinese invasion, lived in India, and was so impressed by what he there saw that on his return he sent four boys to England to be educated. There are about fifteen great families in the country.

The head of each holds a vast estate by feudal tenure. Each of these heads had to submit the name of one son. The names were put in a billet box, and the Delai Lama, who is the incorpation of a Buddhist divinity, and consequently never makes a mintake, drew out four. The boys were sent to Ragby School, and from there to various places of technical education. Three of them have returned to Tibet, the f urth is sponding part of the long vacation in Teesdale. Is may be remembered that on the nutbreak of the War the Delai Lama sent our King a telegram offering men, and saying that all the monks of Tibet were iccessantly praying for the success of the British arms. About one quarter of the population are mouks. They may in time bring us more velorous aid. One of the boys left Rugby to train with the New Army, and is now said to be passing on his k uwledge to the trueps in his father's province.

The requering was very fice. Lance-Corporal Price, in an amusing ventrilequini caterialoment, scored decisively, walle in a "Cello" solo Priva'e Mess was enthusisstically recalled. Sergt. W. E. Davies contributed a very acceptable o mic song. "Y n'vo got a long way to g ," and was I udly applauded. Sedekinson (baritone) having been associated with the celibrated c mpany, while the brother of Private Albert Tate (tenor) composed "The Lily of Killarney." The last vocal effort was, perbaps, the gem of the evening, and the weird appeal will live long in the popular recollection. In a word the people of Barnard Castle are deeply indebted to the musical talent of Deerbelt Camp for an evening's real amusement and edification. A social dance followed.
