LOCAL RUPAL FOOD CONTROL.

Farmers Slaughtering Sheep for Sale Must Register.

A meeting of the Barnard Castle Rural Food Control Committee was held on Wednesday sen The chair was occupied by Mr R. W. Raine, and there were present Mrs Brown, Cockfield; and Messrs J. W. I. Davidson R. Armstrong, H. Blackett, J. Tarn, G. R Gent, G. A Thompson, G Linsley F. Adamson, J. Thomps in T. W. Baiobridge (executive officer), and R Brown (inspector).—The Clerk announced that under the Sugar Order the previous Saturday was the last day appointed for receiving applications for registration as retailers, and, of the 43 applications sent in, all but two were sellers of sugar at the beginning of 1915. Of these two, both at Cockfield, one was a small shopkeeper whose husband was serving in the War, but who had had the shop only since August, 1916. The other was the branch store which had only recently been opened .-The committee agreed that both these shops be registered

Prompt Action with Butchers.

The Clerk said that under the Meat Order not only had the prices to be fixed, but a list of them had to be posted conspicuously in the shops. He had written to the butchers throughout the area, and they had sent a schedule of their prices, which, it was noted. varied much. "If you as the Food Control Committee are not satisfied with the prices submitted, you can inspect the accounts of each butcher, and ascertsin what he has been paying for his animals, and what charge be bas been making for his beef. From the accounts of the butcher you can fix the price," added the Clerk.-It was printed out that whatever the charges no one could make a profit of more than 211. a pound, or 20 per cent .- Mr Tarn asked if Mr Brown, the lospector, had power to inspect a tradesman's books whether a complaint was made by the puble or not?-Mr Bainbridge: You. All records and documents shall be open to inspection by any person authorised by the Food Controller or the committee. - Mr Tarn said that was useful information to butchers.

Farmers Selling Mutton to be Registered. Mr Tarn asked whether farmers who killed sheep and sold the mutton would have to be registered, have licensed slaughter houses, and come under the same category in every way as butchers? - Mr Bainbridge said they would have to be treated exactly like butchers in this respect.-Mr Lineley remarked that that was only fair .- Mr Armstrong added that unless there was something done there would be a good deal of such killing and selling carried on.- Mr Tarn moved that the prices sent in hold good for this month, and then come up for revision.

Retailing Flour.

It was stated that there were 25 claims for compensation by retailers of flour for the allowance of the difference in prices between those of their old stock and the new prices which came into force on Monday, all of which had been checked. The claims would be sent to headquarters in due course.- The Clerk added that the forms had come in splendidly, and the succeeding Saturday was the last day for caterers
