The death at the age of 87 is announced of Sir Richard George Glyn, Baronet, of Gaunt's House, near Wimborne, Dorset, a sousin of Mr T. R. Glyn, of Whoriton House. The decease baronet was formerly a Captain in the Dorset Imperial Yeomaury, and also a Capitain in the 1st Royal Dragoons, in which capacity he rode In the charge of Scarlett's Heavy Brigade at Balaciava, and was also present at the Battle of Inkermann (1854). The Crimean Medal with three clasps was awarded him. In the early sixties he was one of the first Europeans. after Livingstone, to explore the Victoria Falls (Zambesi). Subsequently for about Falls (Zambesi). Subsequently for about twenty years (1865-1884) he was Master of the famous Blackmore Vale Foxhounds (Somerset and Dorset), and was considered one of the best judges of a horse in the County of Dorset. Sir Richard married in 1868 the daughter of Major Fitzgerald, of Maperton House, Wincanton. The baronetcy, and the estates, which consist of some 10,000 acres in the County of Dorset, together with an invested sum of 260,000 settled therewith by the late Sir Richard Carr Glyn, in 1838, now devolve upon the deceased's son. Richard Fitzgerald, D.S.O., formerly a lieutenant in the 1st Dragoons (Boer War), and now a Temporary Captain in the Army Service Corps, and also an A.D.C. He has received in the present war the raigula of D.S.O., and the French Legion of Ionour.
