Potato Spraying Lecture at Startforth.

On Tuesday, March 12th, an interesting lecture was given at Startforth schools on the subject of potato spraying by Mr W. P. Chamney, of the Food Production Department of the Board of Agriculture. A large audience was present, and were throughly interested in the excellent slides shown. Mr Chamney commenced by a short explanation of the structure of a fungus, and then detailed the "points" of the potato fungus, which causes the blight or "demic." He then proceeded to show how the fungus attacks the plant, and by growing in the leaf gradually destroys this food-producing organ, causing the plant to die prematurely. The production of the seeds of the fungus on the leaves was then shown to be the fungus on the leaves was then shown to be a source of danger to the tubers underneath, and then a clear demonstration was given of how the coating of the leaves by the Burgundy wash prevented the infection of the leaves, and also the tubers indirectly, thereby giving the plant a temporary immunity from disease. The wash was abown in preparation, and the right formula illustrated for both Burgundy and Bordeaux mixtures. Slides showing the damage caused by blight, and how the spraying damage caused by blight, and how the spraying protected, and therefore saved the crop, were also given. The final slide on wart disease was a grave warning against the perils of not reporting the same to the Board of Agriculture. and the meeting terminated with a vote of thanks to the lecturer and lanternist for the able way in which the matter had been presented.

The following are the general outlines of the scheme under which sugar for jam will be distributed to growers of fruit during 1918. Forms of application can be obtained on and after March 28rd, at the offices of the local Food Control Committees, and must be returned on or before April 4th. Applications will be considered only when they are made by persons actually growing the fruit which they also to preserve. The form of application will require the applicant to state, among other things, the number of persons rationed for sugar as members of his household, and the amount of fruit which he is likely to have available for preserving.
The extent to which such applications can

be met will be determined by the Director of Sugar Distribution in conjunction with the

Local Food Committees.
Two classes of permit will be issued to applicants, one for soft fruit available between the 8th June and 31st July, and the other fer hard fruit available between 1st August and 80th September. "Soft fruit" will be taken to mean any fruits normally ready for preserving before the end of July, and in this category rhubarb may be included. "Herd fruit" will be taken to mean any fruits ready for preserving after 31st July, and in any area where vegetable marrows are usually preserved the local committee may in its discretion include them also in this category. Where Local Committees decide to include marrows, they will require applicants

It has been decided that in no case shall the total amount of sugar for making jam for home consumption exceed ten pounds per head of the household. There will be many people, however, who will have fruit in sufficient quantities to caable them to use more sugar than this, and in these cases they will be invited to state what weight of fruit they are prepared to convert into jam, on the under-standing that they are to place the jam so made at the disposal of the Local Committees at prices not exceeding the current whole-

It is requested that all correspondence on this subject may be directed to the Local Committees and not to the Sugar Department of the Ministry of Food.
