"Their conclusion is that, while economies in distribution have clearly resulted from the smalgamation, it is desirable in the interests of the consumer that a concorn of this megnitude should be subject to a definite form of Government control. With this conclusion the Food Controller agrees, and he is consider-ing how best to safeguard the interests of the asumer.'
