THE Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales) hereby give Notice, as required by the above Act and the Regulations made thereunder, that they propose to vary the minimum and overtime rates and the definition of overtime employment at present in force under the respective Orders of the Wages Board for male workers of 18 years of age and over of all classes throughout England and Wales so as to provide as follows, that is to

1. As respects male workers of 18 years of age and over (other than the special classes of male workers such as Horsemen, Cowmen, Shepherds and other classes for whom special rates have been fixed in various areas): (a) A reduction of the hours (excluding Bunday work) for which the minimum rate

shall be payable, and over and above which the weekday overtime rate shall be payable, to 54 in "Summer" and 48 in "Winter such hours are at present in excess of those hours or in excess of 52 hours all the year 'An addition to the weekly wages at

present payable in respect of 52 hours a week all the year round, of the following amounts, that is to say : For workers of 18 and under 19 years of

ago, 3/- a week. For workers of 19 and under 20 years of sge, 4/- a week. For workers of 20 and under 21 years of

For workers of 21 years of age and over,

(c) An adjustment of the overtime rates to a basis of time and a quarter on weekdays and time and a half on Sundays calculated on the revised minimum rates arrived at under the provisions of paragraph (b) above. and in relation to the "Summer" hours;
2. As respects the special classes (above referred to) of male workers of 18 years of age and over, for whom special rates have been

fixed in various areas: (a) An addition to the revised rates for ordinary workers of the respective ages arrived at under the provisions of paragraph 1 (b) above, of the respective sums which represent the differences at present existing between the rates for ordinary labourers and for the special classes of workers in the various areas; and a reduction of the hours to which the revised rates shall apply in those areas where the number of hours the special classes has been fixed, in the same proportion as the reduction of hours

for ordinary labourers in those areas.
(b) The application to the special classe workers of the overtime rates arrived at under the provisions of paragraph 1 (c) above, in lieu of the overtime rates at present applicable.

Provided that the rates arrived at under the above provisions shall be adjusted to muitiples of sixpence in the case of the weekly wages and to multiples of a halfpenny in the case of the overtime rates per hour.

Judge McCarthy on Jurisdiction in Equity. His Honour Judge J. W. McCarthy sat at four o'clock on Monday evening, when two cases occupied His Honour's attention for twenty mlautes. Mr W. J. Watson, registrar, was present, and the solicitors in court were Mr J. W. B. Heslop, Mr J. L. Dawson and Mr T. B. Heslop.

Mr J. W. B. Heslop made application under the War Emergency County Court Powers Act for leave to sell or foreclose in a case affecting Dr. Smeddle, who was the owner of certain

Mr J. W. B. Heelop appeared for the surviving members of the first marriage, and Mr J. I. Dawson represented Mrs Bayles, widow, Cotherstone, who had married since the death of the well-known soldier.—Mr Heslop said this was a case for the administration of the estate of Isaac Burtonwood, who was a colour-sergeant in the Durham Light Infantry, and who died intestate on the 24th of January, 1916, letters of administration being granted in March the same year. Notwithstanding repeated applications to the defendant, who was the administratrix, they could not induce her to render an account, and Mr Heslop was acting for three or more beneficiaries.—Mr Dawson: As a matter of fact my client has not been sufficiently advised on her position. I have gone very carefully into the case, and I am glad to say there is sufficient estate to pay the five children. The money, with the exception of £3, so far as they are concerned, is intact. The widow very properly claims that she paid into the estate sumething like £100, and thus and there was a mortgage of 2250 upon the house, which left a margin of £310 clear. She is only entitled to an income of one-third of the real estate, and in equity to a settleme out of the deceased's money, part of which was applied to the purchase of the house, and part went into a war loan.—The Judge advised the advocates to effect a settlement, and suggested an adjournment till the next court so enable them to come to a decision. There were obviously two or three questions for settlement, and if the matter was not decided then he must ask in due course that the pleadings be put in. Meanwhile all questions wore in reserve. He was glad to see those equity cases coming to that court, because he had an impression it was not used as much as it ought to be for the purposes of economy.
That court could be very useful in saving expense, and the costs of London agents. Bar at once agreed .- His Henour: We have the right to adjudicate up to £500, and we 2500. You can then apply to the Court of Chancery to let it stand over and be taken in the County Court.
