INFANT CARE AND HOME-NURSING.

INFANT GARE AND HOME-NURSING.

Last Thurs' any sthermon a child-welfare exhibition visited Barnard Castio, a public meeting being held in the afternoon, which was presided over by Mr. C. H. Welford, M.D., the Urban Council Medical Officer Model clothing and cots. home nursing appliances, hoasehold hints, and pictures of garden cities were on view, and there was a demonstration of infant care and home nursing.

The Chairman said it was a special privilege for him to be there that aftern on to support meeting like that, though the function at Rokeby had doubtless robbed them of a larger audience. He wished his hearers particularly to understand that a meeting like this inaugurated a thoroughly new movement for the benefit of the nation at large, in which a consciousness was aroused that in the mother and child they had the greatest asset that the country could possess; and the progressive work had culminated in the creation of the office of a Ministry of Health, the first thing done by Dr. Addison being to create an immense feeling favourable to the well-being of mothers and children, and especially the health of the child. There was a conservatism abroad, due to ignorance, in which well-meaning persons resented the inverference of doctors in, for example, the condemnation of the oli-fashioned being, and that sort of thing, but what the nation was now anxious about was the exceedingly he vy mortality amongst children, and the preservation of the health of the mother and that of the child.

Miss Cooper Hudgeon said she heard Dr. Addison speaking in London lately, and he emphasized the great need for education in health matters, for, said he, the people veritably periahed for lack of knowledge. What a child was and ought to be depended upon the mother. Child welfare was popular, but they could not set on without centres, and she proceeded to enlarge upon the great need of fresh air, good food and cleanliness in the rearring of infants. Bad air, bad food and bad housing very adversely affected children. Baby wanted

month, and if a woman had six children she was indeed a very busy woman. This was really a woman's lifework, and there was no more important duty a woman could do than to produce a fine healthy baby. It was well worth the care, the thought and the trouble. They were going to have maternity hospitals, and they hoped to see them or stantly thronged by young mothers with their babies, a child in the second year needing as much attention as in the first year of its life.

The Vicar said he was anxious to do all he could to reduce the rate of infantile mortality, recognising as they did that a number of children died without living their allotted span of years. But Barnard Castle compared very favourably indeed with almost all the other places in the county of Durham, and he would like to emphasise the fact that in their maternity and child-welfare centres they had expert knowledge first-hand.

Miss Nixon honoured the women of Barnard Castle because Miss Nixon honoured the women of Barnard Castle because their children were turned out nicely, though it sometimes required a good, sharp mistress to teach girls what should be taught in the craille. Money would be seciously needed in the time to come, for food and fuel, and sustained effort would have to be put forth.
