Alleged Theft of Coal at New Copley Colliery. Alexis Atkinson and Maggie Robinson pleaded guilty to separate charges of stealing coal from the pit heap at New Copley Colliery on the 17th of February.—P.C. Atkinson detected the offence at 10.45, the defendants filling four buckets with coal, and the witness stopping them.—Mr Rife, in the witness box, said the defendants had no right to the coal, and had been warned.—The defendants pleaded extension in that they had been deprived of what they alleged to be a customary dose of good coal, and further pleaded hardship.—A fine of 10s and costs was imposed in each case.

Professional Rabbit Satcher Fined for Snaring Rabbits.

Joseph Beadle, Thornton Bridge, pleading guilty to snaring 21 for game rabbits, on the 18th of February, on the 18th of February, Robert Brown, farm bailiff, stating that Mr Reginald Pease, the owner, had declined to look over the offence.—Complainant said they kept watch of snares set, and defendant came up with two rabbits in a bag, and he took a rabbit out of a snare, all of which were taken from him.—A 5s. fine.

Quigley said the machine was his own, and he had bought it 8 months ago. Witness was not satisfied, and called the police, accused stating that his name was "Jones." When a detective arrived prisoner showed fight.—P.C. Tyrrell said he received Quigley into custody from the Middlebrough police. When afterwards charged with the theft at Barnard Castle the man said, "I am guilty."—Prisoner now entering the same plea, said he "broke away." A report from the Chief Constable of that city was not favourable to the prisoner.—The Bench sent Quigley to goal for two months with hard labour, and highly complimented Mr Brechner for his conduct, and that gentleman handed Supt. Riddell the sum of 12s 6d for the Police Orphanage Fund.

THE URBAN COUNCIL.

WAR MEMORIALS: FIFTY NEW HOUSES. Mr C. Hedley presided at the monthly meeting on Thursday night, when there were present Messrs E. Arrowsmith, W. Hodgson, T. Thompson, C. J. Smith, R. Woodham, J. Gay, the Rev. H. W. B. Bloham, and Messrs J. L. Dawson (clerk), J. H. Veitch (assistant clerk), C. H. Welford (medical officer), L. Simpson (surveyor), Brown (inspector), and Turnbull (collector).—17 feet 11 inches of water in the reservoir.—The Works Committee recommended that 22 be changed the Primitive Methodist Church for water for organ-blowing, and that 24 10 be the amount per annum for the Wesleyan Church organ.—The windows of Thorngate Mill are to be boarded up.—The elementary schools are closed till the 7th of March.—No case of measles, diphtheria, or scarlet fever has been notified during the month, although one death had resulted from influenza. Four deaths and five births were registered.—The Clerk is ascertaining the fees for the analysis of gas, and the Gas Company are to say whether they can supply gas for all the lamps which were allowed to be lighted on the 1st of March.—The question of the gasworks, caused by erosion, has been fenced, pending repairs.—The Belgians being on the eve of departure, the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre will be removed in the first instance to the Dispensary, if available.—Precaution steps are to be taken to prevent the gasworks Quarry.—The question of a rubbish tip is to stand over.

The Fallen Brave.

The Chairman said that although the war was not quite at an end other places were making suggestions as to what should be done to perpetuate the memory of fallen heroes, and he thought the remembrance of local lads who had sacrificed their lives should be recognized in some fitting and becoming manner. He invited the town as a community to think about it seriously. Personally he thought they should have a town's meeting, and make everybody welcome.—Mr Guy moved that the Chairman convene a public meeting of the inhabitants, but Mr Smith thought they should be in no hurry about it. They should think well over what form the memorial should take.—The Chairman: I have had several at me to know if Barnard Castle was going to do anything. Something should be done.—The Vice-Chairman: When peace is declared let us have a town's meeting.

The Fourth Durham's Obelisk.

At a meeting of the Sanitary Committee on the 20th February the Clerk read a letter—outlined in our notes last week—from Lieut.-Colonel K. J. W. Leathor, 4th Battalion Durham Light Infantry, intimating that there was a fund in the regiment known as "The Memorial Fund" amounting to about £100, and suggesting that a suitable memorial should be erected in the town to the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of this battalion who fell and died in the 1914-18 European War, the Council to arrange for a suitable site, and be responsible for the maintenance of the memorial. The Chairman reported that Lieut.-Colonel Leathor had asked for an appointment for himself and architect to meet the Chairman and Clerk of the Council. Various sites were suggested at the interview, and the Chairman was to report the result in due course.—The Chairman now said that he and the Clerk had met the architect and architect. The monument would be 30 feet high, on a 15 feet base, and the site selected was nearly opposite to the entrance to Messrs Barclay's bank. The idea of the designer being that it should, if possible, be overshadowed by the church tower. Dawson had pointed out the obelisk in Galgate. Mr Woodham thought the site a little too far down, and suggested the Newgate motor and other traffic.—The Clerk thought the obelisk should be supplemented by a war memorial.—Mr Woodham: But it is only a suggestion.—The Chairman: Yes, they are the best fixed their minds on this, but it is for us to meet them.—Mr Arrowsmith suggested the bottom part of the top enclosure.—Mr Smith thought they had individually to look at the site.—Mr Wiseman: Nobody could have any serious objection unless it would materially interfere with the traffic.—The Chairman suggested the obelisk be erected from the convenience to the Cross, and war memorial substituted.—Mr Wiseman spoke of the removal of the Cross bodily.—The discussion closed on the remark of the Chairman to the effect that the matter be thought out by the next meeting.

The Housing Problem.

The Chairman moved that fifty houses be erected—a first lot of 25, and afterwards a second lot of 25, according to the exigencies of the time.—Mr C. Smith seconded.—Mr Wiseman moved an amendment that the Council at once agree to the erection of fifty houses.—The Vice-Chairman seconded.—The motion was adopted by the casting vote of the Chairman.

Miscellaneous.

On the proposed slight deviation of the footpath from the barracks lane to the street it was agreed on the proposition of Mr Smith to make the path up to the corner of the lodge and put in a gateway, it being understood that Mr Richardson's offer was accepted, and that gentleman breaking legal tie.—On a letter being read from Mr J. Andes, secretary of the town's improvement association, asking for consent at the house, the Council agreed to send the letter on to Mr Rife.—Lord Barnard appropriately acknowledged the receipt of a letter of sympathy from the Council on the death of his father.
