LOCAL AND OTHER NOTES.

ON Saturday morning last, at Buckingham Palace, His Majesty King George held an investiture at which Major T. B. Heslop, of the 6th Durham Light Infantry, was invested with the insignia of a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order. Major Heslop, the first native of Barnard Castle to receive this distinction, gained it in the 1918 Spring German offensive for "while commanding a Battalion holding an outpost line, all the officers except three subalterns and himself were killed or wounded by shell fire. It was entirely due to the personal hold which he had over his men that,

with their left flank enveloped, they stood their ground fighting to the last." THE death took place on Sunday, at Low Barns Farm, Winston, of Mr James Tunstall, whose portly and familiar figure and kindly greetings will be missed at Barnard Castle market. He farmed at one time at Gilmonby,

and was 63 years of age. BOWES MUSEUM TRUSTEES' MEETING EXPERT VALUES THE TAPESTRIES

AT £50,000.

The half-yearly general meeting was held on Thursday afternoon, MI J. I. Daws in presiding at the initial stages, and there being present Lord Gainford, Professor Bedson, and Messrs R. T. Richardson, W. J. Watson, J. G. Hall, R. Woodhams, C. J. Smith, M. J. Dixon, E. Lingford and O. S. Scott (curator).

The Late Lord Sarnard. Mr Dawson, from the chair, in the course of

an appropriate speech, said Lord Barnard had a very high ideal of his public duties, and was associated with many public bodies, to which be gave the greatest care and personal attention. In fact it was his self-sacrifice which in public amerura helped to shorten which in no little measure helped to shorten his life, and the speaker moved the following resolution, having remarked that one of the despest objects of his beart was the care of the Bowes Museum and the general interest of the trust :-" That the Trustees of the Bowes Museum and Park learned with deep regret of the death of their Chairman, Lord Barnard, and extend to the heir and all members of the tamily their deepest sympathy in their bereavement; and wish to place on record their appreciation of the services of the late of one of the most active and valued members." -Lord Gainford seconded, and remarked that it was with deep sorrow that one felt that one had lost one of their most valuable colleagues, is that he took an extraordinary laterest in that Museum. He was not only a master of details but an individual who looked at the main object for which that great institution had been founded. Lord Barnard's training in the offices of the Charity Commissioners was inestimable, and the knowledge so acquired was aways at their disposal. 


