ANGLICAN SERVICES AT LARTINGTON HALL.

Perhaps the first Church of England service ever held within the precincts of Lartington Hall took place on Sunday, 12th October, in the handsome chapel attached to the fine residence of Mr Norman Field, the aterior of the chapel having recently heen thoroughly restored. This is, indeed, an historically interesting fact. The initial service was conducted by the Rev. E. J. W. Nesbitt, Curate of Romaldkirk, who is in charge of St. Cuthbert's Church, Cotherstone There was a good attendance on the opening day, and the congregational singing was most hearty. Mr and Mrs Field played the organ, and the service, which is to be continued every Sunday afternoon, was much enjoyed. There was formerly a chantry chapel at Lartington and early records speak of Robert Wytham of Grantham, whose will bears date December. 30. 1440, who was grandson of Sir Rober Wytham.

DEATH OF MR T. DENT.

The death took place at the Bowes Museum early on Monday morning, aged 68, of Mr Thomas Dent, who had just completed 20 years as an attendant at this institution. He was the son of Mr Thomas Dent, farmer, Mickleton. The deceased was for many years valet to the late Mr Sussex Milbank, of Haw steads, Barningham, and, while in residence in London and Paris, he gained experience of men and matters which served him well in after-life. Mr Milbank, whose Town House was 2, Cleveland Row, St. James's, S.W., was always punctilious in relation to the discharge of his liabilities, and rewarded his faithful servant with a good annuity. The late Mr Dent married the only daughter of the late Mr Peadon, formerly schoolmaster in Baldersdale who was the first stationmaster at Mickleton. A widow and three sons and one daughter are left-two sons being officers in the army.

In a lovely decorated church, the Rev. T. FROM TEESDALE.

Down by the river the Black Prince Works are slowly but surely coming into being.
