LOCAL AND OTHER NOTES.

The handsome cross just erected in Gainford churchyard as a memorial of the Gainford men who lost their lives in the war was unveiled on Saturday afternoon by the High Sheriff of Durham (Sir Arthur Francis Pease). The Rev. H. C. Watson dedicated the memorial, and the Ven. rector, Canon Derry pronounced the blessing.

Dr. Phillips Bedson, the professor of chemistry at Armstrong College, Newcastle, since 1882, and who has a charming little summer residence at Lartington, is shortly to vacate the chair. Dr. Bedson is a Trustee of the Bowes Museum.

Last night, in a team debate, the Barnard Castle Literary Society proposed that athletics play too large a part in present day life, the County School being in contradiction.

In connection with local building operations, two-ton girder recently arrived in the town. The improvements being effected at the Golden Lion inn in this town have laid bare the site of its erection, which is 1679. It was in this year that the Parliament impeached Danby; the king dissolved it and called another. The new assembly, which met in October, proved equally uncontrollable as the last. It passed, by a majority of 79, a bill excluding the Duke of York from the succession; declared the King's guards and standing army illegal; and passed the Habeas Corpus Act.

This afternoon, at Dacre Churchyard, the remains of Mr William Dawson, of Groystown House, Stainton, Penrith (72)—father of Mr Fred Dawson, of the King's Head Hotel, Barnard Castle—will be interred. The deceased gentleman made a reputation as a farmer, but even more as a dealer in and trainer of hunters.

Mr John Heaton, of Low Startforth Hall, was an extensive buyer at the Gainford short-horn sale. To-night, in the Lecture Hall, a meeting will be held in connection with the Middleton Co-operative Society's employees' dispute.

Interest in the forty-second annual North Eastern Cyclists' Meet at Barnard Castle at Whitsuntide is great on Tyneside, and there promises to be a very large attendance of wheelmen at the gathering. Mr J. I. Dawson, clerk to the Urban Council, has written to Mr D. Macpherson, honorary secretary of the Meet, as follows: "Your letter was laid before the Council at a meeting, and I was directed to say that the Council will be pleased to bestow their patronage on the Meet, and will do everything to welcome the cyclists and make their gathering a success." Lord Barnard is the patron of the Meet.

The annual parish meeting which was held in the Wesleyan school-room, Marwood, on Monday, was interesting. The accounts were considered satisfactory, and it was reported that the Colchester footpath was now complete, and the improvement would be beneficial to pedestrians. Mr John Wilson, who presided, remarked that their clerk (Mr T. K. Bell) had undergone an operation for appendicitis, and was progressing towards recovery. Mr J. A. Turnbull, of Barnard Castle, had obliged them by being present instead of Mr Bell, and the meeting thanked Mr Turnbull, and also requested him to convey to Mr Bell their regret at his illness, and hopes of a speedy recovery.

A lecture on the life of settlers in Western Canada and the work of the church amongst them, was given in the Literary Institute, Gainford, on Tuesday, by the Rev. A. J. Lickman, M.A. The lecture was illustrated by lantern slides under the direction of the Rev. Leo. Conway and Rev. Francis Cathrick. The Rev. H. R. McDermid, Mr R. H. Elleston and Mr E. D. Trotter were amongst those present in a large audience.

Mr Norman Field has placed one hundred three-year-old brown trout from the Houton fishery, Shillingshire, in the High Fishpond at Lartington.

This morning, the chief business at the Great Bridge Police Court will consist in exempting from tax farmers and shepherds' dogs.

Mrs Marley's hockey eleven against the Barnard Castle team won five to two on the Durbolt Camp Field, on Saturday.

An interesting item for the Rokeby people is the fact that Colonel E. C. Meyscoy, Thompson, who has sat for the Handsworth (Birmingham) Division since 1906, announces in a letter to the chairman of the Handsworth Unionist Association that, owing to ill health, he will not seek re-election at the next General Election.

PRIMITIVE METHODIST CHURCH. On Sunday, March 13th, missionary sermons were preached at Barnard Castle, by the Rev. H. Yooll, of Newcastle, and at Boldron, by the Rev. P. McPhail. A missionary meeting was held at Boldron, on Saturday, the 12th, and at Barnard Castle on Monday, the 14th, addressed by the Revs. H. Yooll and P. McPhail. The services of Mr Yooll as deputation were much appreciated. Mr Wm. Coates presided at the Barnard Castle meeting with his usual force and fitness. Collections were taken for the missionary fund.

A lecture on gardening was given by Mr Ingham, head gardener Egglestone Hall, who dealt with the present work on allotments, and some useful information was gathered.

A hockey match between Cockton Hill School Girls, Bishop Auckland, and Middleton School Girls was played at Middleton on Saturday, which resulted in a win for the home team by one goal to nil.

The annual concert in connection with the Teesdale Glee and Madrigal Society was given in the Assembly Hall, Middleton, on Saturday night. The work taken was the cantata, "The Bride of Dunkerron," by H. Smart. The principals were Madam Isa Walton, soprano, Monkton; Mr Tom Purvis, tenor, Newcastle-on-Tyne; Mr Wm. Hendry, baritone, Newcastle-on-Tyne; Mr Wm. Thompson, Darlington, was again the conductor, and there was a full orchestra accompaniment. The choir was evenly balanced, and reflected great credit on the conductor, while the principals were all that could be desired. The hall was packed to its utmost capacity with an appreciative audience. After the cantata the following miscellaneous programme was given by the artists:—Selections by the band; song—Osway, a waltz—Mr Tom Purvis; violin solo—Madame Alice Blonkhorst; Duet—Watkinson what of the night?—Messrs T. Purvis and Wm. Hendry; song—The Moorish maid—Madame Isa Walton; song—The lowland sea—Mr Wm. Hendry; part song—Rolling down to Rio—choir. Mrs J. Langstaff, L.R.A.M., was the accompanist.

WESLEYAN CIRCUIT. At the quarterly meeting held at Barnard Castle on Thursday, March 17th, there was a very large attendance from nearly all parts of the circuit. The membership returns showed a slight increase during the year. Mr R. Douglas Ord was nominated by an unanimous vote as a candidate for the ministry. The Foreign Missionary report showed the income to be £221 16s. 5d., the largest amount in the history of the circuit. A resolution was passed asking the Government to include in its licensing legislation local option, shorter hours for sale, clubs to be placed under the same regulations with respect to liquor as public houses, and no liquor to be served to persons under the age of 18. Both ministers, the Revs. H. Fregoning and J. T. Tunstall, were invited to stay a third and second year respectively. The members of the meeting were afterwards entertained to tea by Mr and Mrs R. Ord.

The first of a series of lectures on agriculture was given in the searth Memorial Hall, Staindrop, on Monday night, by Mr R. W. Wieldon, M.A., lecturer in agriculture at Armstrong College. The subject treated was the results of experiments in the North of England. Mr H. L. Fife presided over a good attendance, and an interesting discussion took place.

CRICKET AND TENNIS CLUB. The general meeting of the Barnard Castle Cricket and Tennis Club was held on Monday in the Witham Testimonial. In the absence of Mr E. C. Watson, Mr J. G. Hall, J.P., presided over a record gathering. Mr Watson (treasurer) presented the statement of accounts, which showed a balance in hand of £25 12s. 6d. Mr H. Chester (hon. secretary), in his report, referred to the successful cricket and tennis season. Mr H. C. Watson was elected president, and additions were made to the list of patrons. The names of over 40 ladies and gentlemen were presented for appointment as vice-presidents, and the following officials were chosen to carry on the work of the club:—Messrs G. S. Warren, hon. treasurer; A. C. Willis, hon. assistant treasurer; W. B. Chester, hon. secretary; R. Duxford, hon. assistant secretary; H. Typical cup-tie football was witnessed, and in the end Copley claimed the right of meeting Barnard Castle in the final, at Cockfield, on April 2nd, by reason of an old goal victory.

Raby Moor United had Middleton United as visitors, on Saturday, and a very pleasant game resulted in a victory for the home team, who scored three as against two goals credited to Middleton.
