VISIT OF D.L.I. BAND. ENJOYABLE MUSIC IN THE BOWES MUSEUM PARK.

Visitors to the Bowes Museum and Park have been numerous during the week-end. The bowling green and tennis courts were well patronised on Saturday. During the day the proceedings were enlivened by the Cockfield Prize Silver Band, which played a choice selection of music, under the conductorship of Mr J. T. Jackson.
