

BOWES FARMER'S DEATH. TRAGIC END OF MR C. HUTCHINSON.

TRAGIC END OF MR C. HUTCHINSON.

We record with much regret the death of Mr
Christopher Hutchinson, Sieightholme, Bowes,
which occurred on Wednesday evening at
Darlington Hospital. Mr Hutchinson, it will
be remembered, was seriously injured in an
accident which occurred on the road to Kirkby
Stephen on Thursday, October 14th. He was
removed to Darlington Hospital for treatment
and died there, six days later. He was 68
years of age and had farmed at Sleightholme
for many years, being held in high esteem in
the wide agricultural district of which Bowes
is the centre. He was noted as a breeder of is the centre. He was noted as a breeder of Swaledale sheep and was a prizewinner at several local agricultural shows.

Inquest Opened and Adjourned. Mr J. T. Proud, Coroner, opened an inquiry into the cause of the death of Mr Hutchinson at the Darlington Hospital on Friday morning.
The relatives of the deceased were represented
by Mr A. H. Nicholson, from the office of
Messrs W. J. and H. C. Watson, Barnard Castle, the family solicitors. Only evidence of identification was taken.

Miss Ezard Hutchinson, of Sleightholme

Bowes, identified the body as that of her uncle, Christopher Hutchinson, for whom she kept house. She was not present at the accident on 14th October, she said, and he was not brought home. He went to sell some sheep at the Kirkby Stephen Auction Mart, and travelled kirkby Stephen Auction Mart, and travelled by motor lorry, with him being his nephew, John Robert Etty, and Messrs Matthew Hastings and Joseph Kidd, farmers. Percy Hutchinson drove the lorry. At 10-30 the same night she heard that there had been an accident. She went straight through to Darlington, arriving at 12-30, and saw her uncle at the hospital. He was conscious, but did not tell her what had happened. His only comment on the subject was "They were comment on the subject was "They were coming too fast." He was very ill, and she stayed in the ward all night, and remained at Darlington until Tuesday. Her uncle died at 6-45 on Wednesday night, but she was not present at the time.

At this point the Coroner adjourned the inquiry until Wednesday, November 2nd. The Funeral.

The remains of Mr Christopher Hutchinson were interred at Bowes Churchyard on Saturday afternoon, a large gathering of neighbouring agriculturists and others testifying to the universal esteem in which he was held. The Rev. Fred Summersgill, Vicar of Bowes, read the burial service in the church and gave an address full of comfort for the bereaved. The mourners were Miss E. Hutchinson (niece), Mr J. R. Etty (nephew), Mr Matthew Hastings (Dove Hall), Mr T. M. Thornborrow (Mellwaters), and Miss Horner. Colonel H. C. Watson and Mr A. H. Nicholson of Messrs W. J. and H. C. Watson, solicitors, Barnard Castle) attended, and among others were noticed practically the whole of the members of the Swaledale Sheep Breeders' Association, including Mr W. Rees, Kirkby Stephen (general secretary), Mr J. W. Dent, Fair View (secretary of "A" district), Messrs Joseph Peacock and J. L. Peacock (Punchard), Mr and Mrs James Peacock (Spanham), Mr R. W. Raine, J.P. (Middleton-in-Teesdale), Mr Thomas Collinson (Stauhope Gate) and his sous, Mr C. Waller (Baldersdale), Mr James Iceton (Willoughby Hall), Messrs Robert Harker and W. H. Atkinson (Arkengarthdale), T. H. B. Dent (Bowes), R. M. Metcalfe (Hundah), T. Bayles (Gilmonby), T. W. Guy (Gilmonby), James Richardson, W. Kidd (Towler Hill), R. W. Dent (Pecknall), John Scott (Keld), J. R. Peacock (Boldron), and many others.
