

OBITUARY.

MRS ISABELLA HEPPLE.

Amid many manifestations of sorrow and sympathy, the funeral of the late Mrs Isabella Hepple took place on Wednesday at the Lynesack Churchyard. Mrs Hepple died on Saturday with tragic suddenness. Her death cast a gloom over the whole village, where she was so well-known and so highly respected. Her husband was killed in the Great War, and she has carried on a general and grocery business, Woodland is indeed the poorer by her passing. Of a gentle and amiable disposition, she was loved and respected by all around. She is survived by three daughters and one son, with whom much sympathy is shown. Mrs Hepple was the eldest daughter of the late Mr and Mrs John Waller, her father having been chief engineer to the Woodland and Crake Scarr Collieries. Like her parents, she was a staunch Churchwoman, and loved the Mission Church of St. Mary's, Woodland, for which her parents did so much work. She was a "corner-stone" of the church up to her death.

The funeral was one of the largest seen in the village, all classes turning out to show respect to such a noble character. The service in Lynesack Parish Church was fully choral, Mrs Owen, the Vicar's wife, being at the organ. The psalm and Nunc Dimittis were chanted. The hymns sung were, "How bright those glorious spirits shine" and "They whose course on earth is o'er," and then the procession wended its way to the grave. The Rev. Frank Owen, Vicar, and Mr T. W. Gittens, lay missionary, a friend of the family, took part in the service in the church and at the graveside.

MR THOMAS LEE.

One who was a well-known figure in Barnard Castle until recently has passed away in Mr Thomas Lee (aged 78), who since the war had lived in retirement in the town. Mr Lee, who was a bachelor, was for many years a farmer at Bowes, and when the war required men he volunteered for service, although 57 years of age, and served at home and abroad until July, 1917, being discharged for disability. He was of an amiable disposition and good company, fond of long walks, and ever a pleasant companion to those who liked to accompany him on his country rambles. The Editor of the Teesdale Mercury, who has more than once been for a long walk with him, bears testimony to his sterling character and the fund of general knowledge of agricultural and other matters that he possessed. He was a member of the British Legion and proud of his war service, often saying that if the need for men again arose he would be only too ready to join up again. The funeral takes place at Bishop Auckland today.

MRS SANG.

Mrs Mary Jane Sang, of Vane Road, Barnard Castle, whose death on Monday at the age of 79 we record with regret this week, was the widow of Mr William Sang, tailor and outfitter, who died in July, 1912. Mr Sang, it will be remembered, had a shop in the Horsemarket later occupied by Miss J. A. Barker, the branch shop recently relinquished by the Teesdale Mercury Limited. He had the distinction of making the uniforms of the 7th North Yorkshire Rifle Volunteers on the formation of the corps in the years 1859 and 1860. He was a keen angler and compiled a book on the subject. He was also a noted piccolo player, and it is said that in the early days of gramophones he played specially for the making of a record. Mrs Sang, who was of a quiet, retiring disposition, was highly respected. Her remains will be interred at Barnard Castle this afternoon.

MR W. ROBINSON.

The funeral took place at Staindrop yesterday of Mr William Robinson, whose death occurred at the age of 96. Mr Robinson, who had lived at Staindrop about 40 years, was engaged for many years as a market gardener. He was highly respected, but being of a retiring disposition he never sought public positions. Many of his descendants live in the locality. The funeral was conducted by the Rev. W. Simpson, Vicar of Dunkinfield, Cheshire, who is doing duty for the Vicar of Staindrop (the Rev. H. S. C. Spurrier), who is on holiday.
