LIGHTING-UP TIMES.

Ramshaw School children, who have often been heard at the Teesdale Musical Tournaments, were heard "on the air" last Thursday evening, when under their head master, Mr W. J. Weatherley, they gave a programme from the Newcastle studio of the B.B.C.

The Rev. R. Oakley Moate, of Stoke-on-Trent, who recently completed his course of study at Handsworth College, Birmingham, began his ministry in the Barnard Castle Methodist Circuit on Sunday, when he preached at Stainton in the morning and at Trinity Church, Barnard Castle, in the evening. Mr Moate will be one of the speakers at the circuit gathering in Trinity Church to-morrow (Thursday) night, when the inauguration of the amalgamation of the Barnard Castle (Wesley) Circuit with Newgate Circuit will be celebrated.

The L.N.E.R. are to give half-day excursion bookings from Barnard Castle, Middleton-in-Teesdale, Mickleton, Romaldkirk and Cotharstone, on Sunday, September 8th, to Bishop Auckland, Durham, Sunderland, Darlington, Middlesbrough, Redcar, Marske, and Saltburn. Those travelling to Sunderland will be able to spend over five hours there, and passengers for Redcar will arrive there either at 12-1 or 2-30 p.m., and leave again at 7-15 p.m. In connection with the Grand Prix Motor Cycle Road Races, day excursion facilities will be available from Barnard Castle to Douglas by the 4-42 p.m. train on Monday, 9th, and on Wednesday, 11th September. The inclusive return fare will be 18s.

Seats Provided at Staindrop.

At a meeting of the Staindrop Parish Council, seven iron seats presented by the freeholders of Staindrop, to be placed on the village green and to be known as "The Jubilee Seats" in commemoration of 25 years' reign of H.M. George V., were received. The chairman, Mr T. A. Coates, on behalf of the Council and the village, accepted the very fine gift from Mr F. R. Jackson, secretary to the freeholders, expressing with admiration and appreciation the thanks of all concerned. The whole Council associated themselves with the chairman's remarks.

The flag on Barnard Castle Church tower was at half-mast yesterday, when the funeral of the Queen of the Belgians took place.

After completing 25 years as Rural Dean of Appleby and Kirkby Stephen, Canon R. W. Harris, Rector of Longmarton, Appleby, has resigned.

Bathers who Trespassed.

At Barnard Castle Juvenile Court on Thursday three lads were charged with trespassing on the L.N.E. Railway at Butterknowle. A constable said he saw the boys cross over the siding at New Morley Colliery and get out on to Cockfield Fell. They had apparently been bathing, using the bushes on the other side of the line as a screen for undressing. An official of the railway company said warning notices were posted up and there was a fence on both sides of the line. Recently there had been an epidemic of people removing wooden keys from the rails, which might easily lead to serious damage. The three lads, who denied that they had crossed the line, were ordered to pay the costs, 5s.

Volpre's Circus at Raby Castle.

In order to augment the funds of local charities Lady Barnard arranged for the appearance at Raby Castle last Saturday of the celebrated Volpre's Circus. Although the performances are confined to ponies and dogs a very clever programme was put on, the miniature "ring" being formed in the park between the cricket ground and the castle. There was a good attendance, and the various turns were much enjoyed, the entertainment being as perfect as it was novel. Lady Barnard attended with her daughter, the Hon. Rosemary Vane, and her two sons, the Hon. John Vane and the Hon. Gerald Vane. Lord and Lady Burghley were also among those present. Lady Burghley, by the way, is a daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch. Lord Burghley is the son and heir of the Marquis of Exeter.

Cycling over the Moors.

The Barnard Castle Excelsior Cycling Club's run on Sunday was over new ground for the club. Leaving the Central Cafe, Barnard Castle, at 9-30 a.m., they rode towards Eggleston, over the moor road, a road of splendid surface for a moor road, the heather in full bloom and the sun at its best, making a rare scene of natural beauty. Stanhope was reached at 11-30 a.m., and after a short look around dinner was partaken of, after which the club proceeded via Wolsingham to Tow Law and Satley, by the camp where four or five thousand troops are participating in manoeuvres. The scene brought memories of war-time days. Satley was reached at 2-15 p.m., and here one of the club member's friends bestowed upon the club all the hospitality which characterises the north people. After an enjoyable time at Satley the party began the return journey, leaving at 6-20. As the party left Tow Law rain began to fall in torrents. The party rode as far as Witton-le-Wear under terrible conditions. Then capes were discarded, and they rode through West-Auckland to Staindrop, where the weather began to break again. Capes were donned, and the last lap of the journey was made in good time, home being reached at 9 p.m. after an enjoyable day.
